HAPPY SLEEP HABITS

Make sleep your superpower! Scientists say children need at least nine hours of sleep every night to feel happy and stay healthy.

Getting a good night's sleep is important for happiness. If we have too little sleep, it can make us grumpy, easily upset and less able to concentrate and learn. It can also mean we want to eat sugary foods that aren't good for us and make us less likely to want to exercise. Can you find a bedtime routine to make sure you get a good night's sleep every night?

TOP TIPS FOR SLEEP

- Try and stick to a regular bedtime, to help you get to sleep faster and sleep better.
- * Have a milky drink an hour before bedtime.
- Make your bedtime space cosy, quiet and dark light and noise can keep your brain wide awake, making it harder to fall asleep.
- Switch off your tech! Devices like phones, tablets and laptops give out a blue light that makes your brain think it's daytime, keeping you awake. Apps, games and messaging keep your mind whirring rather than letting it rest. So switch these all off an hour before you want to sleep and read a book instead.

Amethyst Class

Our school was selected to take part in a baseline research project by the Testing and Standards Agency. This week the reception children have been completing this element of their baseline assessments. This hasn't taken up too much time and the class have been busy learning all week. The reception children particularly enjoyed their outdoor play in the rain this week with their umbrellas and welly boots! The year one children have recapped their tricky words from reception class and the reception children have been introduced to sound talk. In maths the year 1 children have been busy comparing numbers. To help them with this, they used 10s frames. As part of PE lessons they have been learning about body shape and in art they have drawn self-portraits. The portraits will be on display in the KS1 corridor.

Ruby Class

All of our year 2 children have ben counting in 10s and 1s, whilst all of the year one children have worked within 10 with Miss Wardle. As part of their English work, the children have been busy writing sentences with adjectives. The children have been introduced to the UK in geography and in science they have continued their work on habitats. Accurate footwork is the focus in PE and in RE they have been sharing books which are special to them.

Opal Class

The book that the children are using for English is 'Traction Man'. This is a firm favourite amongst the children. They have been using the book to write labels for characters and writing captions. The year three children have also been working on place value including placing numbers on a number line and adding 1, 10 and 100 to numbers. In history, the class are studying the stone age – looking at timelines and exploring the concepts of BC(E) and AD. The children are learning about properties of materials in science, this week they were sorting materials. In French the children were busy learning greetings.

Emerald Class

English for Emerald class children has focused on writing using conjunctions, inferring character emotions and writing in role. The year 4 children have been focusing on place value with Mr Northcott in maths, whilst the year 5 children have been taught by Mrs Williams and Mrs Robinson also focusing on place value. They children have particularly enjoyed their science work this week, building circuits. In French they have learned the names of basic shapes. Computing was all about cyber bullying and in dance the children worked on incorporating circles into movements.

Sapphire Class

Year 6 children have followed the trend and have focused on place value this week in maths, but also added some work on rounding and negative numbers as well as written addition and subtraction methods! Sapphire children, like those in Emerald class have worked on incorporating circles into dance movements. In music they have learned about pulse, completed a preknowledge quiz and are developing their singing skills. Grammar lessons have focused on fronted adverbials, grammar articles and conjunctions. They have been busy editing their writing in English. In geography the children are leaning about 4 figure grid references before moving onto 6 figure references. They also found time for RE work on harvest.

Mrs Robinson (art and DT)

Ruby class have started to study and make animal masks, Amethyst class have painted self portraits. Opal and Emerald class are both making vegetable soup in design technology, Sapphire class children have been studying anatomy in art.

On the last afternoon of each half term (or the previous day, if we are in church), we will be hosting a 'share my work' afternoon. Parents will be invited to come into school from 2.00pm to sit with their child and share with their child the work that has been completed that half term.

The plan is to make this a 'drop-in' style event and parents can come in at any time between 2.00pm and 2.45pm and then join us for our final assembly of the term at 2.50pm if they wish to. This will give those who have children in different classes the opportunity to visit them all.
